FUN FACTS

- Our American kestrel, May, was hatched in the wild and arrived via a wildlife rehabilitator. A wing break compromised her flight and she was rescued and rehabbed in North Carolina. After being deemed nonreleasable, she was transferred to Brandywine Zoo.
- Kestrel populations have dropped more than 90% in Delaware, which listed them as an endangered species in 2013.
- The smallest species of falcon in North America, the American kestrel hunts by hovering and dive-bombing its prey (usually rodents and insects).

THREATS & CONSERVATION

Loss of forested areas and nesting habitat (including snags and dead trees) can impact numbers for owls and other birds of prey.
