AMERICAN **KESTREL**



MALES

- Slate blue wings and helmetsRusty-colored body
- Distinct black band on the end of rusty tail

FEMALES

- Mottled brown with a creamy, spotted chest
- Thinly banded black & rust tail

AMERICAN KESTRELS ARE ABOUT THE SIZE OF A DOVE OR PIGEON. THEY OFTEN HUNT NEAR OPEN FIELDS OR PERCH ON POWER LINES.

• The population of American Kestrels (*Falco sparverius*) is decreasing across North America, particularly in the Mid-Atlantic region which shows a loss of nearly 90% over 50 years.

• American Kestrels are listed as an Endangered Species in Delaware, Threatened in New Jersey, and listed as a species of conservation concern in Pennyslvania and Maryland.

• YOU can help the Delaware Kestrel Partnership monitor and study American Kestrels!
