Delaware Zoological Society Executive Director Message

There is a great deal of excitement on the horizon at the Brandywine Zoo following a remarkably successful 2025.

In 2025, the Brandywine Zoo celebrated our 120th year in operation, making us one of the oldest zoos in America. More than 61,000 guests helped us mark that milestone anniversary.

That's the highest number of visitors we've had in the past 10 years! We saw increases in our major events (Brew at the Zoo, Sip & Strolls, Boo at the Zoo and Spirits at the Zoo). Our inaugural capital campaign gala, Zoobilee, was held in March and was sold out two months in advance. More importantly, the gala raised over \$110,000 towards our Zoo Re-imagined capital campaign.

But perhaps the most gratifying moment of the year came in early fall, when we secured the final funds necessary to begin construction on the next critical step in improving our facilities- building our new multi-species habitat. The habitat will hold up to three different species (we won't have a final determination on which species until the spring) and will feature a 325-square foot off-exhibit holding. That building will include a large window to allow year-round viewing of our wildlife

providing an improved visitor experience as currently, when the animals are "off-exhibit" in cold weather months, visitors are unable to see the wildlife.

Demolition has begun and the new habitat should be open by the first of June. While construction is happening, you will still be able to visit your favorite animals. The barn yard, South

American habitat where our giant anteater resides, and flight exhibit with our eagle, ravens and sandhill crane, will all be open. And our lemurs will be keeping a watchful eye on the construction project for their new neighbors.

We have had to make a few programming adjustments while we complete this project. One of significant note is that we've moved our very popular, and always sold-out, Brew at the Zoo back to September for 2026.

We'll monitor the construction progress as it develops and promise to keep you apprised. But we are very excited about this new zoo addition and hope to see you all out during the year and at this year's Members Only Event on June 11th.

Meet our newest female Andean condor, Jennifer! Jennifer is just over 43 and a half years young. In their natural habitat Andean condors live about 50 years on average, but in human care they can live up to 70+! Jennifer has a fairly calm personality and appreciates a good nap (I mean, who doesn't?). She also enjoys interacting with her keepers; gently tapping on the window to get their attention or watching them through the exhibit mesh as they clean up her holding space. It can take her some time to become comfortable with new large enrichment, but she likes to push around metal canisters and loves to target train. Jennifer can often be seen at the top of her exhibit perched on the rocks. She is housed at the front of the zoo in our condor exhibit with our 4-year-old male, Luca. Jennifer has let Luca know that she is the boss in their relationship and makes it clear when she wants to have some alone time, but she is getting more comfortable with him every day and has started showing signs of interest in getting to know him better.


Luca

The Thrill of the Drill!

What would you do if a fire broke out at home? Or if someone nearby had a heart attack? While scary to think about, it's an important first step at being ready in an emergency. Those scenarios could also happen at the zoo, so staff must be prepared to respond appropriately. One way we achieve that is by conducting safety drills.

As an accredited organization with the Association of Zoos & Aquariums, we are required to perform a primary set of drills each calendar year. They include fire, bad weather, human health, and animal escape. Much like schools, businesses, and other organizations these days, we practice active shooter drills as well. To that list of 5 we add "animal pest" and "lost child" since they can certainly become emergencies to manage onsite. The responsibility for coordination and tracking of annual drills falls on the Safety Team. Any staff member is welcome to join, with the team currently composed of individuals from the Animal Care, Zoological Society, and Conservation Science & Learning departments.

Our safety drills can take place at any time, so if you ever find yourself at the zoo during one, please calmly

follow directions given by staff. Don't worry, it won't be long until you can return to your visit! We are sure to cover material thoroughly but efficiently, usually taking 10 minutes in total. Remember what they say, "practice makes perfect". Maybe running your own drill or simply talking through everyone's roles in an emergency is something you can do this winter while inside together. It surely won't be time wasted!

Ambassador Highlight—Greek Tortoise

Rocky is the zoo's Greek tortoise ambassador. He's a staff favorite for many reasons, but the obstacles he's faced make him an especially strong advocate for his species. At only seventeen years old, he's considered young for a tortoise. This species typically lives into their fifties, with some making it well past one hundred! Rocky is a relinquished pet, so the details of his past are uncertain, but there is evidence of malnutrition that likely took place during his early years.


Rocky has some misshapen scutes (the colorful plates on the outside of the shell) and a loss of mobility in his back legs. Throughout his recovery journey, keepers have given Rocky laser treatments and have adhered a number of objects to the bottom of his shell to aid him in moving around his enclosure. Thanks to proper nutrition and a team of caring and hardworking keepers, Rocky is comfortable and living a happy and fulfilled life.

Despite his mobility differences, Rocky spends his leisure time exploring his enclosure, relaxing in his water dish, and snacking on his specialized reptile salad. He is a very messy eater, and his favorite food is sweet potato.

Rocky makes a great animal ambassador because of his easygoing temperament and his charismatic personality. Rocky is a joy to work with, especially when he "dances" when his shell is scratched.

We can help turtles and tortoises like Rocky by shopping for pets responsibly and knowing how to properly care for an animal for the entire length of its remaining lifespan before we commit to caring for them. Unwanted pets should never be released into the wild, nor should wild animals be ever taken in as pets; injured wildlife should be turned over to the proper authorities as soon as possible.
